Complex	1	1+	The cat, who is scared of dogs, ran under the porch.		
Compound- complex	2+	1+	The cat, who is scared of dogs, ran under the porch, and the dog ran after him.		

SENTENCE CONSTRUCTION ERRORS				
Run-on Join the clauses with a semicolon or a comma and conjunction.	with a semicolon	No: It's a beautiful day we're going to the park.		
	Yes: It's a beautiful day, so we're going to the park.			
Sentence		No: A beautiful day to go to the park.		
	sentence to form an independent clause.	<i>Yes</i> : It is a beautiful day to go to the park.		
Comma splice	Add a conjunction.	No: It's a beautiful day, we're going to the park.		
		Yes: It's a beautiful day, so we're going to the park.		
Misplaced modifier	Move the modifier so it is next to the word being modified.	No: Located just down the road, we love going to the park.		
		Yes: We love going to the park located just down the road.		

Types of Clauses

Independent The dog ate her homework.

Dependent Because the dog ate her homework

- ► Clauses have a subject and a verb.
- ▶ Only independent clauses can stand alone.
- ▶ Dependent clauses start with a subordinating clause.

comma	joining two independent clauses	Commas can be used to join clauses, but they must always be followed by a coordinating conjunction.	
	setting apart introductory and nonessential words and phrases	Commas, when used properly, set apart extra information in a sentence.	
	separating items in a list	My favorite punctuation marks include the colon, semicolon, and period.	
semicolon	joining together two independent clauses (never with a conjunction)	I love exclamation points; they make sentences seem so exciting!
